In just over a year of operations the **Du Nord Foundation** has been a resource to over **75 small business owners** experiencing hardship after the 2020 civil unrest and not just that, we have nourished over **24,000 neighbors** through our barrier-free food shelf, the Community Market.

RECOVERY FUND 2020

This fund was created as a way to support small and under-represented business owners, whose physical stores or offices were damaged as a direct result of the civil uprising of 2020 and were under-insured, or lacked critical funding to get them back into business again.

These emergency grants ranged from \$1,000 to \$15,000. The business owners put the money to work in a variety of ways, from the rebuilding of store interiors to new computers, and even office supplies. While the use varied, the gratitude was always present. One such business was Creative Kuponya, which provides a new approach to therapy derived from art, body movement, and the celebration of culture. Owners Sara and Jamil passed along their appreciation; "We can not thank you enough ... your dollars will go towards everything from furniture to file folders. Every cent counts right now!" By the fund's completion in October 2020, we were able to disburse \$498,751 in emergency funds to 75 businesses in Minneapolis and St. Paul.

The Du Nord Foundation Community Market sees itself as a barrier-free food shelf with the heart of a mutual aid organization. Unlike many traditional food shelves, we pose no limitations on access. Food shelves often place limits on the number of times people can access aid in a month, or ask for proof of need, or proof of residency within a geographic boundary. As a mutual aid organization, we rely on community support, community input and try to remove all barriers for those who access our resources.

Our core and founding staff has direct experience in the hunger relief system, knowing what the barriers to food security have been for our communities. We wanted to make sure that this wasn't a traditional charity approach. We don't think of what we're doing as just hunger relief - it's not just about food. Everything that we do encompasses the health, safety, dignity, and respect of our neighbors. We ensure they have a choice in every aspect of their experience.



On Monday, May 25th, George Floyd was murdered by a police officer on 38th Street and Chicago Avenue. The days that followed were filled with public unrest. On the evening of May 27th, the uprising throughout the city of Minneapolis reached Du Nord Craft Spirits where their warehouse was burned and sustained water damage.

The subsequent civil unrest and destruction in May 2020 left a tear in the fabric of Minneapolis. Initially, co-founders of Du Nord Craft Spirits, Chris & Shanelle Montana together with Tina Rexing, owner of T-Rex Cookie, pitched in where they could by raising money for affected businesses and operating an emergency food shelf, but it quickly became clear that these efforts would need to be sustained in order to make a significant difference towards advancing social justice.


This is how on June 23rd, 2020, the Du Nord Foundation became a formal nonprofit with the goal to address social justice through economic justice, wealth and prosperity.

INCOME AND EXPENSES


The results of 2020 were achieved in an emergency situation thanks to the outpouring support from our community as well as national and international contributions.

Currently we are working on reaching the balance and sustainability that will help us succeed long term.




INCOME AND EXPENSES 2021

INSPIRING SUPPORT

In just a little over a year of existence, we have been lucky to receive different kinds of support from our neighbors, community organization, government entities and businesses alike.

Back in 2020, John and Lisa called us to ask how they could help. I knew we needed a letter to prove to the IRS that we needed our nonprofits status urgently. They gladly agreed to write the letter. Soon after, we became an official nonprofit better equipped to DU more.

Other ways in which neighbors have contributed is with in kind donations, food drives and birthday fundraisers. Twin Cities CO-OP Partners reached out to us form the very begging to donate the proceeds of their Black Lives Matter sign sales. From then on, they have made financial contributions every month and in February of 2022 we became the recipients of their Round-up program.

Even though we are a small and new nonprofit, **Hennepin County** and the **City of Minneapolis** have formed partnerships with us and put their trust in the work we do for our neighbors.
